Collecting Stamps

"Philately" is a word concocted by a Frenchman c 1863 from Greek roots meaning "the collection and study of postage stamps and postal history." More commonly called 'stamp collecting' it is still a worldwide hobby enjoyed by persons of all ages and backgrounds. The earliest stamps in Australia were issued by the State of New South Wales on 1 January 1850, followed by Victoria on 3 January. Van Diemen's Land came in 1853 changing to Tasmania in 1856. The other states followed soon after. The nation of Australia did not issue stamps until 1913.

All of these early stamps are part of our history and ones used in very small longforgotten townships are very hard to find.

The Bendigo Philatelic Society was founded on 5 August 1931 and still meets on the first Tuesday of each month. The venue is Kalianna School, Nolan Street Bendigo from 7.30pm. Members and guests may buy and sell stamps and get advice on all aspects of collecting.

An Annual Stamp Fair is being held on 13 August at St

Andrews Church Hall, Myers St Bendigo from 10am to 4pm, Dealers will be there to sell, buy and help with valuations of stamps and postal items.

Bogus Countries: 2nd in a series

THULE

Thule in North-West Greenland is one of the most northerly towns in the world (Lat. 77° N) Despite it's remoteness and isolation, the area of **Thule** (pronounced Too-lee) is of interest to stamp collectors.

In 1910 the Arctic explorer and anthropologist, Knud Rasmussen (1879-1933) set up a small mission and trading post at Thule near Kap York (Cape York) in northwestern Greenland. They provided food and provisions in exchange for Eskimo furs and other locally produced products. Their main office was in Copenhagen, Denmark, since Greenland was (and still is) a Danish possession. The exploitation of deposits of cryolite which is used in the production of bauxite, turned Thule into a mining town.

It didn't really need stamps, because all mail from Greenland to the mother country, Denmark, was carried free of charge. Nevertheless in 1935 the town commissioned a set of four stamps to mark the anniversary of its founding. The stamps were to pay for mail transport in both directions between the Thule Station and the main office in Copenhagen, as there was no government mail service.

Mail addressed to other parts of Denmark or other countries required additional franking with Danish stamps. A secondary purpose of the stamps was to raise funds for the station via the sale of stamps to collectors.



The 10 øre value depicted Rasmussen, the 15 øre the Danish flag and the Thule mountain, the 30 øre some walruses, and the 45 øre a polar bear at Cape York.

A 5th stamp, a 25 øre value depicting the local church was added in 1936.

Used for local post until 1938, when the first stamps of Greenland were introduced, they were issued with the full permission of the postal authority, but it considered them to have the same status as Christmas seals.

All of these stamps have the inscription "1910 THULE 1935" across the top and the denomination of value at the bottom, except for the 25 øre stamp which has "1936 –

THULE -1936" across the top. They were designed by the Danish painter Knud Kyhn and printed on un-watermarked paper in sheets of 50 at the Thiele printing works in Copenhagen.

Perforated 14 by 14.5 (horizontal stamps) or 14.5 by 14 (vertical stamps). There are many printing flaws which enable the plate position of each stamp to be easily determined.

A complete set of the five locals (mint or used) will cost about \$5-\$30. Used examples on cover, are much more expensive. They are not listed in standard catalogues but in the specialized Scandinavian catalogues.

The Danish Red Cross reprinted these stamps from the original plates in 1979, honouring Knud Rasmussen's birth centenary. The reprints are perforated 11 and have the Danish word for "reprint" on the back.

Thule is now known by the wonderful palindrome - Qaanaaq. It has a population of around 600 and enjoys a Polar climate with long cold winters and 24 hours of daylight in the summer (July) when temperatures rarely exceed 10 degrees Centigrade.

The area is now host to an American Air Base.

The A.G.M. was adjourned until September 2016 meeting is it was impractical to complete the financial figures to 30th June and present them at the July meeting a few days later.


