#### Recognising Roman – a brief summary of Ideas received to date

- 1. That The Annual Stamp fair be known as "*Bendigo Philatelic Society Inc. Roman Lemega Stamp Fair*"
- 2. The Christmas Auction be known as "Roman Lemega Christmas Auction"
- 3. A Display of 2 or 3 pages on a 3 monthly basis (i.e. 4 displays a year) with points awarded for each entry. Total points added up and the winner announced at the end of 12 month period.
- 4. That *Lois Whatley Competition* be changed from 12 months to 6 months and a *Roman Lemega Competition* be run for the other 6 months. Each competition to have 25 items to be found.
- That on the Club's September meeting each year a "*Roman*" display night be held. Displays to be 2 pages on any subject with a *Roman* theme. Displays to be judged by members vote on the night and a perpetual trophy be awarded.

#### Bogus countries and their stamps No. 5 ~ Rattlesnake Island

Rattlesnake Island is located in Lake Erie, on the Ohio side of the United States border with Canada. It is one of the many small islands in the lake.

The Island has had a variety of owners since being set up as a holiday resort in 1966 by James Frackleton, a Cleveland stamp dealer. In spite of being one of the smallest islands in the lake it can boast the only local post operation ever sanctioned by the United States Postal Service.

In the early days, mail was delivered to the islands in Lake Erie by boat in the summer, and horsedrawn sleigh in the winter. By 1959, Ralph Dietrick, a veteran World War II pilot, and owner of Island Airways, was providing mail service for many Islands utilizing the famous Ford Tri-motor, or "Tin Goose," as it was affectionately known. Rattlesnake Island Local Post enlisted this service upon its inception, adding a little bit of philatelic and aeronautical romance to the story. Many of the 1966, 1967, and the later 20th Anniversary stamps pictured the Ford Tri-motor. The Tri-motor also appears on the rubber hand stamp applied to most mail.

The local post was launched on August 27, 1966. Three rectangular stamps were issued, a 5c postcard rate stamp depicting a map of the area, a 10c letter rate stamp showing a Ford Tri-Motor approaching the island and a 25c parcel rate stamp showing a US Coast Guard boat at a dock. There




were two distinct printings of the set.

The US Post Office objected to the use of the rectangular format as they considered that the stamps looked too much like regular US postage stamps. As a result of this objection the stamps were withdrawn on December 8, 1966. From December 9, 1966 until January 22, 1967 mail from the island did not have any local postage stamps.

During that stampless period. It is believed that some 200 items of

mail were dispatched. During this period it was the habit of the postmistress to write "Fee Paid" in the lower left corner of this mail. Such covers are keenly sought after (valued now at more than US\$100) making it a key item in any Rattlesnake Island collection.

To solve the problem of the USPS's objections it was decided to reissue the set in a triangular format which was quite acceptable to the Post Office. The new set was issued on January 23, 1967.



From then on, an annual set of stamps was issued until 1989, when new owners decided to terminate the local post.

It was, however, relaunched in 2005. Again there was an annual set of three stamps.

The local post continued until 2013, ceasing with the death of Rattlesnake Islands founder James P. Frackelton.

Throughout its history, the

Rattlesnake Island local post has released around 200 stamps either perforated or imperforate. Generally, with a few exceptions, most are not difficult locate.

Overall the design of the Rattlesnake Island local post stamps are thought to be of good quality. Generally they show scenery of the island, feature Lake Erie history or the local flora and fauna. There certainly is a lot of interest for topical collectors.



In 2003 as the result of an extensive study of the Rattlesnake Island local postal service John Wells, a retired English civil servant issued *The History & Local Post of Rattlesnake Island, Lake Erie.* Collectors and dealers enthusiastically received the book as it provided much background information plus a handy pricing guide that had previously been unavailable. The book includes listings of the variety of cancels and cachets used by the local post. A revised and updated edition was released in 2009.
