
be talking about, he replied, "It's a secret!"


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Change is ever present.

Show and Tell

Do you have something in your collection that you find interesting? Of course you do. That's why you collect in the first place. I would like to invite everyone to share a stamp or other item from their collection and tell us all what it is that you like about it. Here are a couple from me to start it off.

Someone swapped the towers!

Stamp designers aren't always completely true to the thing they are depicting. A good example of this is this fairly simple Swiss stamp. It show the Cathedral of St. Pierre, in Geneva where the Reformation was first proclaimed in 1536, and in which Calvin then preached for 30 years. As you can see from the stamp, the cathedral is a real hodge-podge of different styles all tacked together to give what eventually became a very interesting and quite beautiful building. The building incorporates more different architectural styles than any other in Switzerland and deserved being chosen for the Swiss architecture series. The problem that the designer had was one of balance because he not only had to show as much of the church as possible (he has cheated a bit there) but also had to find room for all the lettering and the value figure. The cathedral is shown as if you are standing in front of the portico but as you can see, one of the outside towers is slightly taller than the other and the taller one was interfering with the space where the value tablet was to go. The problem was solved by reversing the towers. In reality, the tower on the right should be on the left and vice versa. They may have thought that nobody would notice. At right, the cathedral seen from the rear. Looking from the front, the taller tower should be on the left.







Mirella Zisko told CBC News she was pleasantly surprised to receive a postcard in the mail on Jan. 12, especially since it arrived at her workplace.

But then she turned it over.

Someone, it seemed, had taken a red pen to the simple message from her long-time friend Oscar, crossing out words as a teacher would and correcting them for apparent grammar mistakes. "

Zisko describes Oscar as a man in his 60s, a former co-worker who grew up in and emigrated from the South American country, and recently went back to visit. English is his second language, the Vaughan, Ont., woman says.

When she received the card, she was stunned.

"First I was mad, and then I just felt upset for him," she said. "He's such a good friend, and he's an older gentleman, and I just felt hurt for him that someone would go out of their way to be mean."


