
#### Get Well Soon, Bob!

The Ballarat club has two special items being produced for the fair, a first day cover and an overprinted miniature sheet. Both of these items are limited to 100 and they usually go fast. # Roo On The Road To Ruin

Stamps have often been politically motivated. The Italian East Africa stamp shown above was a reflection of the Fascists obsession with themselves as builders of a new Roman Empire. Australia has also used stamps for political purposes. The first States stamps bore Queen Victoria's head to leave no doubt about who was in charge. This was to change when the Labour Party finally came to power bringing new ideas and slogans like "Jack is as good as his master". These were mostly born in the Shearers' Union and spread around the country by the itinerant work force that kept the country profitable. It was also reflected in the first Australian stamps, the Kangaroo and Map issue that showed no deference to a monarch.

The Postmaster-General, Mr. C.E. Frazer was less than impressed with the new issue that was being forced upon him and in April 1912 (before the real stamps were released) he released a cartoon to the press of what he said the new stamps should look like. It showed a kangaroo, bowed down by a ball and chain, heading along "The Loan Road" to visit the money lenders. When he drew criticism for this, he agreed to modify the design which he did by adding the word "Postage".

#### By George - He's Popular!

One of the places we promote our fair is on Stampboards, the online discussion group that has fifteen thousand philatelists on its worldwide member list. Long before the fair, members McGooley, and Traralgon3844 (sometimes known as Paul) were asking if dealer George was going to be there and after finding that he was, started looking for ways in which they could compete for his wares. True to form, on arrival, after a quick cuppa to wash away the long journey, McGooley and Paul headed for George's table, from where they hardly strayed.

After the sort of attention normally reserved for rock stars, George also needed a cup of tea leaving McGooley and Paul to diligently study his stock books.



# When did back-stamping letters on receipt finish?

Postal history collectors love old letters that have back-stamps which were added by the receiving post office. They allow you to see how long the letter took and can be made even more interesting if stops along the way have also added marks. This was done to early Australian mail but it is a bit of a shock to realize that the practice was discontinued in Australia as long ago as 1911.

After the United States and New Zealand both ended the practice in 1909 without the sky falling, the Postmaster-General, Mr. Josiah Thomas, announced that he could see no useful purpose for continuing the practice that would justify the considerable expense being incurred. In a statement to the Sydney Morning Herald he stated, "Millions of letters pass through the Department. Why spend valuable time in date stamping that vast amount of correspondence in order that we may be able to trace the movements of an occasional letter delayed in delivery?" Of course, he has a point but economics gain was certainly philately's loss.
