Bendigo Philatelic Society Stamp Fair 2019

Cold, wild weather ripped through the state at the weekend. It was snowing heavily in Malmsbury as this editor was preparing to leave, in fact I almost stayed home as we have lambs being born at the moment.

I have a theory that a lamb being born on a freezing cold day does the same job as back in the old days when a midwife would lift a newborn baby by its feet and smack it smartly on the backside.

The first sign that all was well was that car parking places were at a premium when I arrived. Inside was a hive of activity as the photo above shows. It was taken well before ten o'clock. The fair started at 9.30 this year in response to the fact that people were queueing up by then last year and had to wait until 10 to get inside. This was obviously a popular decision. By eleven o'clock, the hall was packed with most dealers doing a very brisk trade.

Numbers were well up on last year with over 200 attendees. We are still getting them from all over the state. Some were from places as far away as Ballarat, Charlton, Daylesford, Kerang, Kyabram, Leitchville, Melbourne suburbs, Mildura, Nhill, Rushworth, Traralgon, Shepparton, Stanhope, Swan Hill, Warrnambool, Wedderburn, Yea, and of course a busload from the Warragul club. More than 25% of the attendees were made aware of the fair through the flyers, with reasonable numbers finding out through the media, online, and in the Royalauto magazine.

We need to thank the 4 amigos (Noel Earles, Doug Pearse, Jim Garden, and Peter Doxford) for setting up the hall on Friday afternoon. Also Ken Datson for all of his organising on the day, including that of the Front Bar. Thanks to all the members who assisted at the Front Bar, and to Myrtle Darby for the fantastic freshly baked scones.

Why on earth would Trump want to buy Greenland?
