




Bendigo Philatelic Society Library

I have been thinking it may be a good idea to promote the club library, by including in the monthly newsletter some information on one of the many books we have in stock.

This month I would like to feature the book "The Commemorative Stamps of the British Commonwealth", This hard cover book is presented by HDS Haverbeck of New York and was printed by the Universal Press in Glasgow. Although no printing or issue date appear I found the information covers the years up until the early 1950's. The description's are quite detailed.





The book is basically in two part's, the first part of the book describes various commemorative stamps specially issued by each domination, colony and states or territories of the British Empire, as well as Great Britain, up to the end of the reign of King George VI.

The second part gives, in tabulated form "The uniform series of stamps" of the commemorative series issued by the colonies and dependencies in the same period. A check list is printed in every instance and contains, in logical sequence, all the information required for developing your collection.

Many stamps are pictured throughout the book, giving us a valuable and (although in black and white) an attractive record of about six hundred stamps.

Our library stocks an extensive range of books, leaflets & magazines, which are available to members.

New Zealand 1931 'Smiling Boy Stamps'

A BRIEF HISTORICAL OUTLINE



A mint pair of the famous stamps.

The first 'Health' stamp was issued in 1929. The idea behind it was to raise money for Health, particular Anti-Tuberculosis. The standard letter rate was 1d (within New Zealand), but the Health stamp would carry a surcharge of an additional 1d. The stamp could only be used as 1d postage, but it cost 2d to buy, with the additional 1d going to Health.



The first Health stamp of October, 1929. It was at the suggestion of the Health Department that the proceeds raised would go to Children's Health Camps.

For the following year 1930 another health stamp was planned. The design was prepared in London at the Royal Mint. It featured a 'smiling boy', in front of a landscape scene of trees, a lake, mountains, with the Anti-Tuberculosis Cross in the top left-hand corner together with the NZ four stars of the Southern Cross constellation.

Unfortunately, when the plates arrived from England in mid to late 1930, it was immediately recognized that the <u>vertical spacing</u> between the stamps was not <u>wide enough</u> for the use of the comb perforating machine. Subsequently, the plates were <u>cut</u> and **metal spacers** inserted between the rows which solved the problem but somehow created **uneven** spacing; some rows were wider than others, so often the stamps are not well centered.

The Great Depression, beginning in late 1929, now began to affect the entire world. The New Zealand Government decided to increase the standard letter rate in June, 1931 from 1d to 2d. Consequently, the Postal Department decided to issue a second stamp, and commissioned a local engraver, W.R. Bock to produce a new 2d plate from the original 1d plate.

New Zealand 1931 'Smiling Boy Stamps'


Thus, two stamps were finally printed and issued in October, 1931. The 1d Red carried a surcharge of 1d, whilst the 2d Blue also carried a surcharge of 1d. Unfortunately, with money scarce, the public did not buy these stamps. Only 74,802 of the 1d Red, and 111,929 of the 2d Blue stamps were bought. A mere 778 pounds (\$1,556) was raised for the camps, the lowest total ever on record for any health stamps. Although not listed in any catalogue, there are a number of small errors on both stamps which are to do with color imperfections.

The New Zealand Post Office continues to issue an annual health stamp (or pair) and today these are popular collectable items.

Smiling Boy stamps on covers/envelopes command <u>premium prices</u> as most stamps were torn off and sold as used copies.

The Te Papa Tongarewa Museum (or National Museum of New Zealand) is located in Wellington and holds some significant Smiling Boys material, including the Royal Mint die Proofs and relating correspondence as well as specimens of the stamps and the promotional poster.






News from Paul Brownlie
