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



Philatelic Fables



Stamp Club marks 90 years

MORE than one hundred and fifty albums make up Libby Luke's stamp collection, but that's only a fraction of what the Bendigo Philatelic Society collectively own.

Formed exactly 90 years ago to the day, the society now brings together some 45 collectors as passionate as their founding members in 1931.

Ms Luke has led the group as president for the last five years, but stamp collecting has been her hobby since she was only a child.

"I have been involved with stamps since I was five. Most kids play with stamps, but they give it up, and I never did.

"It's a hobby but it becomes part of your life," she said. "It's just been all consuming at some stages."

A particularly special addition to members' collections will be the society's specially made 90th

anniversary souvenir cover, which Ms Luke said is currently being stamped and postmarked.

She said the group has continued to thrive throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, welcoming three new members in just the last month.

Stamp trading normally undertaken at the group's monthly meetings has also been reimagined to continue during lockdowns.

"We've had lots of people who, when it was all closed down, put together these exchange sheets and they go from person to person, and you take what you would like and that keeps the interest going," she said. "We've tried to, if people are getting away from it, give them a call and include them."

Amid the birthday celebrations the society is also looking to track down decedents of their original members, including Mr F E Wood, Dr A L Beischer, Mr A Alderdice, Mr J B Ross, E S Cahill, C E Neal, W H Bain, W J McLay and H Hillman.

Slania's 100th Birthday









Czeslaw Slania (1921-2005)

The American Philatelic Society offered a free subscription to their newsletter during last year's covid lockdowns and it is always a wealth of interesting articles. I'm not sure how long it will last without actually joining the society but it is still arriving so I'm not complaining.

This month they carried an article about the joint issue from the Faroe Islands, Greenland and Denmark to honour the 100th birthday of the late, great stamp engraver Czeslaw Slania. The work of Slania has been the introduction for many of us to the engraver's art, which in my own case has grown to include engraved stamps from around the world. We live in a different world to the one where an engraver could take weeks to produce a small masterpiece, carving the image on steel, life-sized and in reverse. Here in Australia, we had engravers who were equal to the best around the world but sadly, that is all relegated to history now.

The Scandinavian countries have now (since the end of 2017) ceased engraving their stamps, but for this issue, they asked Martin Morck to engrave them. Martin Morck is one of the finest engravers still working and the issued miniature sheets are well worth seeking if engraved stamps are your passion.

In recent years, Martin spent time in China, teaching the art of stamp engraving so now China has become one of the few countries to embrace stamp engraving for some new issues. France, by law, engraves about half of their stamps so there are still plenty of new issues to keep us poor.
